Message from the Executive Director

In our urbanizing world, cities have become the focal points for investment, communication, commerce, production and consumption. Currently, they account for more than 70 percent of the global GDP. The urbanization debate must, therefore, shift from containing urbanization and its associated ills such as social exclusion, congestion, pollution, crime, informality, and slums to harnessing the gains from urban transformation in order to build productive, healthy and liveable cities which are centres of innovation, entrepreneurship and culture.

As engines for economic growth and wellbeing, cities are dependent on water to support industrial and service sectors, to sustain the health of their residents, and to improve and protect the natural environment. However, the supply of this important resource has not kept pace with the high demand created by increased economic activity and rapid urban population growth, especially in the less developed regions of Africa, Asia and Latin America and the Caribbean.

Outdated infrastructure caused by low investments, poor planning, weak and unenforced legislation and poor governance are some of the major challenges confronting those charged with the responsibility of providing water in our cities. Climate change, including disruptive events such as flooding and droughts, also calls for urgent water-related mitigation and adaptation measures.

With large sections of the urban population living in informal settlements where water and basic sanitation are severely deficient, the challenge is how to expand and upgrade these services to keep pace with urban growth, while ensuring access to an adequate level of services for the poor.

The 21st session of the annual World Water Week in Stockholm under the

theme "Responding to Global Changes: Water in an Urbanizing World" provides a good opportunity to build on the outcome of this year's World Water Day celebrations coordinated by UN-HABITAT in Cape Town, South Africa. Drawing on the theme "Water and Urbanization", the Cape Town event featured 25 technical sessions, interactive interviews and panel debates on the challenges and successes in delivering safe drinking water and basic sanitation in cities.

I am pleased to present, here in Stockholm, a summary report of the World Water Day celebrations and encourage you to draw from the rich debate and recommendations made in Cape Town in your sessions.

During the course of World Water Week, UN-HABITAT and its partners are convening a number of seminars to discuss important issues such as building water related resilience in urban areas, benchmarking governance and partnerships of water operators, the human-rights based approach and community involvement in public water supply, getting the "Five Year Drive for Sanitation" on track, and addressing the challenges of monitoring drinking water and sanitation progress in urban settings, among others. I take this opportunity to invite you to participate in the events highlighted in this brochure.

I also look forward to sharing with you UN-HABITAT's thinking on the strategic value of water in improving the capacity of cities to create wealth during my keynote address at the opening session.
